Packet Basics

Packet used to be very popular until smart phones came along. I began using packet as a means to relay National Traffic System messages beginning in the 1980's. However, NTS and packet have mostly disappeared, compared to what it used to be. Recently, some local hams have shown interest in using the packet mode as a fun alternative to internet and voice modes. I'll start this series about packet by describing the setup that I am most used to, and that is packet using a TNC (terminal node controller.) Packet is a digital mode, meaning that communications is accomplished using tones. Morse code is a digital mode using tones, but the "baud rate" is very slow. Packet uses two baud rates. The first is the rate between the computer and the TNC, and

the second is the rate that is sent over the air. There are several programs for computers that can be used for packet, so I won't go into any detail on these programs. For now I will just say that the baud rate set in your program and the baud rate set in your TNC for communications to your computer must match. For example, you can set the rate in your TNC to connect to your computer at 9600 baud, and the same setting must be used in your program, or you will not be able to send commands to the TNC. So there is a cable, usually a serial cable or USB cable with serial adapter that connects your computer to your TNC. Then, you must also have a cable from your TNC to your radio. The TNC always transmits packet tones at 1200 baud, so you do not have to adjust any settings there. The main thing is to make or purchase a custom cable to connect the radio port on your TNC to the Mic and speaker jack of your radio, or to the data port of your radio if it has one. There will be a chart for the pinout of your TNC in the manual, and another chart for the pinout of your radio. You can order cables on-line, or make your own by using a DB9 connector with solder connections. Now we are getting setup for communicating in packet mode. There will be more to follow in the next bulletin. Questions regarding setting up a packet station are welcome. Several club members have been using the mode for a while now.

Packet Radio Update

There has been an upgrade to the existing W6BA Packet station at the Paxton Repeater Site. The packet frequency is 144.970 with a Node Name of W6BA. This node hosts a bulletin board mailbox or BBS, a chat system, and Radio Messaging System that is capable of sending internet email, as well as reaching out to other local nodes, both in and out of the area.

Packet is easiest with a Terminal Node Controller (TNC) and a 9 pin serial connector and specific packet software. The Kantronics KPC3+ is a predominate TNC in the packet community, though there are others that are quite fine. This device is controlled by a computer using terminal software. There are several fine software programs, one of which is Ipserial-downloaded at the link below with OutpostPMM.

This packet software will also provide a Graphical User Interface (GUI). This GUI looks similar to an email client (like Outlook Express), and will issue all of the commands to the TNC with a click of a mouse. Outpost Packet Manager is one of the easiest and most capable of packet programs available and can be downloaded at http://outpostpm.org/downloads/opsetup300332.exe. This program will handle the BBS and Email portion of the node. While Ipserial can handle other functions that are available on a TNC.

After the software in installed, set up the TNC to KPC3+. Then set up the BBS to W6BA-1 to connect to the local mailbox or connect to W6BA-10 to connect to Winlink Email system. At this point, the user can create a new message that looks like an email.

Hams who own SignaLinks are also able to engage the packet node as well. However, the process is a little more involved, but is quite do-able.

Users are welcome to maintain a mailbox there, if they choose. There is lots of information online about packet and there are a fair number of packet users in the club. If you like the idea of keyboard – keyboard communication or sending email via radio-then ask at the next meeting or on the net in order to be pointed to the right direction to participate with the packet station.
